From the Recipe File—Terry Weber

Blueberry Pancakes

Looking to the season ahead I am reminded of summers long past. Being able to spend summer at the camp on the lake was amazing. And my fondest memory was waking to the sound of Mom mixing up the batter for Blueberry Pancakes. You could set a timer on how long it took three sleepy-eyed kids to get out of bed and to the kitchen table!

It's not a lot of extra effort or time to make them from scratch with ingredients most likely on hand already. Instead of reaching for a box of mix from the cupboard, grab flour, eggs, milk & vanilla. Perhaps you'll create lasting memories for your family. Or just indulge yourself!

INGREDIENTS:

1 pint blueberries Milk (have 1 cup on hand)

2 or 3 eggs (depending on size egg) 1 cup Flour

1/2 to 1 tps Vanilla Extract Oil or butter for fry pan—I use equal parts of each

Cinnamon sugar to garnish (I keep an extra salt shaker with this premixed on hand)

Like most Mom or Grandma recipes there was no measuring going on here. The Ingredient list is approximate and adjustments encouraged. The eggs determine amount of flour to use. Batter should be thinner than box mix, but not too thin. The batter should drop easily from a spoon. Blueberries are added last and gently folded in. Or drop a handful at a time scooping up with the batter as they go into fry pan.

- -Scramble the eggs in batter bowl until frothy.
- -Add roughly ¼ to ½ cup milk and vanilla and give it a mix.
- -Add half the flour and stir, adding flour a little at a time to get to right consistency. If you add to much flour thin with a little milk. It should drip off spoon, not run.
- -Gently fold blueberries into the batter. Be sure the berries aren't too wet.
- -Using a ladle or large cooking spoon drop into hot fry pan (seasoned cast iron or non-stick best).

Each cake should be roughly size of your palm. Don't turn too soon, let them get crispy and golden brown around edges – this is when some berries break & caramelize on the bottom (yum), then flip. The second side will take much less time.

NOTE: Sometimes mom would splurge and buy BROWN'S Honey Butter which goes well. You can use apples, bananas, strawberries, etc., but blueberries are my fave. I hope you enjoy.

Mariaville Lake Dam Update

Can you all believe it? It has been 10 years since our first Engineering Assessment was completed on the MCA Dam. NYSDEC requires owners of Class C dams to submit an Engineering Assessment every ten years. I am happy to announce the MCA has entered into a contract with KB Engineering and Architecture for this assessment to be completed this year. This study will also include a review of the dam's Inspection & Maintenance Plan and the Emergency Action Plan that is kept up to date every year by your dam committee.

This is a mandated assessment that we have been preparing for since the last one. These assessments are not cheap. The estimated cost for the 2024 assessment is \$22,700.00 and that does not include an underwater diver assessment of the bottom of the dam. If no issues are found, we can start saving for the next assessment in 2034. However, if there are issues discovered it will be the responsibility of the MCA to correct any

any concerns. I am hoping that over the past ten years there have been no unseen developments, and we can move forward. I have been completing dam safety inspections every year and documenting concerns as needed.

Many have asked me about the spillway and the pending concreate work. It took the MCA about 10 months to get the permits from the NYSDEC to be able to pour the much-needed concrete on the spillway and old valve stem. Since the winter months it was almost impossible to do the repairs and with summer almost here, we are holding off to complete the repairs until after the summer season when we can lower the lake for such repairs. Please be patient as we are trying to keep everyone happy and still maintain the dam in tip top shape. Unless otherwise mandated by our engineering firm these repairs will be done in late fall of 2024.



SPECIAL NOTE: We will be having our engineering firm at the summer General Meeting being held Friday July 12, 2024, at 6:00pm at the Mariaville Fire house. They will be doing a presentation on the dam and answering any questions you may have. Hope to see you there!

What exactly is the Mariaville Civic Association?

DID YOU KNOW:

- · That the Mariaville Civic Association is the owner of the dam
- That the MCA is solely responsible for all costs associated with repairs of the dam and all NYS mandated inspections and certifications and receives no NYS funding or grants
- In 2024 the 10 year dam recertification must be done at a substantial cost to the MCA. If the MCA
 does not follow these stringent and costly regulations the DEC has threatened to drain the lake.
- That mandatory liability insurance coverage is also an ever increasing MCA expense
- That there are approximately 250 properties on the lake, with a view of the lake, or with deeded access and more than 75% of these property owners have NOT financially supported the MCA in 2023 and prior

IMAGINE WHAT WOULD HAPPEN WITHOUT THE MCA:

- A wonderful recreational resource would be gone
- · We'd have a swamp instead of a lake
- Property values would plummet
- The MCA is run by volunteers. ALL proceeds from membership fees and MCA sponsored events go

RETURNING SNOWBIRDS By Lynne Latella

A few at a time, human snowbirds are now returning from their warmer winter retreats. While we counted the days until spring, they were frolicking far away from snow shovels and layers of clothing. And so were the feathered variety of snow birds that annually return to the Mariaville Lake area. As in the past, a small band of Canada geese flew in announcing their arrival with a fanfare of honks. Closely following them were clusters of quacking Mallards. Although they generally retreat to the woods rather than migrate, robins are now hopping through the grass in search of unsuspecting worms. Gradually orioles, a variety of warblers, rose breasted grosbeak, northern flickers and others settle in to their summer homes while hummingbirds zip around as if late for an appointment.

One of the most elegant of these snowbirds is the Great Blue Heron. They can be seen around Mariaville Lake all summer and fall. Each year, a heron chooses Mud Pond as one of his favorite hunting grounds. He perches completely still on a dead limb overhanging the pond or slowly skulks through the water or along the shoreline into the coves and thick vegetation. This year, I saw two of them searching for breakfast on separate branches several feet apart. Although solitary hunters, they temporarily hooked up for mating. Normally, the only time they are in a group is when they perch in trees to sleep. When I was in California, I saw a spectacular scene in a huge tree at the water's edge. It was completely overcrowded with herons thickly perched on branches like ornaments on a Christmas tree.

Great Blue Herons are the largest wading birds, and growing to about 4 ½ feet, they are one of the tallest birds in North America. They weigh about 5-6 pounds and have a wing span of 6 feet. It takes about two months before the young can fly. Those mighty wings allow them to cruise at speeds between 20 and 30 miles per hour. Watching them soar across the water and gracefully land is a breathtaking sight. They are meticulous about their grooming. Chest feathers continually grow and fray into a cleaning powder which they use to remove fish residue and comb their feathers with a special fringed claw.

Standing like statues, these mighty birds are patient and deliberate hunters. They eat not only fish but also amphibians, reptiles, small mammals and insects. When they spot a fish, they are decisive about striking with their over 5 inch long beak. Their vertebrae are constructed to allow the head and neck to launch forward to catch prey in a rapid bill stab. Once they impale a fish, they shake it to break or relax the sharp spine. They then consume the fish head first so it slides down the esophagus smoothly. It's interesting to see the procedure first hand. Recently I watched a heron catch a fish, spit it out, stab it numerous times while taking sips of water, then down the hatch! Without an after dinner drink, he returned to the water to continue fishing.



When herons issue a prehistoric squawk, it's a reminder that their genus dates back to 14 million years ago, with the oldest fossils found to be from 1.8 million years ago. We in this lake community are lucky to be witness to these remarkable fishers, along with a variety of other colorful, beautiful and musical snowbirds.



GARDENING TIPS By Lynne Latella

Whenever possible, I like to use homemade concoctions to repel weeds and various garden pests. They usually include ingredients readily available and are safe, non-toxic and do no harm if leached into the lake. Although they may not work in every instance, in most cases I have found them to be helpful.

WEED KILLER

Before resorting to chemicals, mix up one of these recipes and use in a sprayer. Sun activates the mixture so be sure to use it on a hot day when the weeds are dry and there is no chance of rain. For lasting results, the solution should be applied periodically. Although these mixtures don't kill every type of weed, they work on most.

1

1 gallon of white vinegar

1 cup salt

1 Tbs Dawn

1 gallon of white vinegar

2 cups of Epsom salts

1/4 cup of Dawn

MOSQUITO RELIEF

At the beginning of the season and in the middle, spray this mixture on the lawn, bushes and other mosquito breeding grounds. More applications might be needed after a hard rain.


1/3 cup stale beer
