Summer Vibes—DIY Weed Killer

WANT TO TRY SOME HOMEMADE WEED-KILLER SPRAY INSTEAD OF USING HARSH CHEMICALS?

VINEGAR

SIMPLY POUR VINEGAR INTO A SPRAY BOTTLE AND SPRAY IT DIRECTLY ON THE WEEDS. SOAK THEM WELL AND WAIT UNTIL IT'S A SCORCHER, DRY DAY. IN ADDITION, MAKE SURE IT'S A NON-WINDY DAY. TWO IMPORTANT NOTES ABOUT USING HOMEMADE VINEGAR WEED KILLER FOR NATURAL WEED CONTROL:

2. **YOU CAN USE A SUPER-STRENGTH VINEGAR** (ALSO CALLED HORTICULTURAL VINEGAR) FOR THIS, BUT IT'S MORE EXPENSIVE AND TOUGHER TO FIND. SO UNLESS YOU HAVE A READY SUPPLY, JUST GRAB A GALLON OR TWO OF REGULAR, 5% CHEAP WHITE VINEGAR FROM THE GROCERY STORE.

1 large head cabbage, shredded
1 medium Bermuda or sweet Spanish onion, chopped

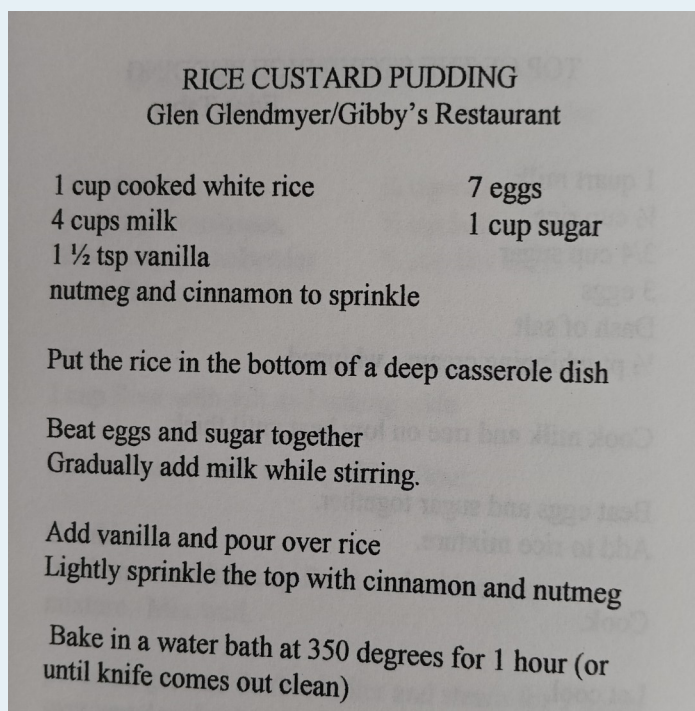
For color, use 1/2 green pepper,

Dressing:

1 cup sugar
1 tsp salt
1 tsp dry mustard
1 tsp celery seed
1 cup cider vinegar
2/3 cup vegetable oil

Mix sugar, salt, mustard and celery seed in small sauce pan. Add vinegar and oil and boil until sugar dissolved.

Cool.
Pour over cabbage.
Toss well and refrigerate

Mariaville Lake Dam Update

The Dam Committee (TDC) has been reconstituted and expanded to five members. The current members are Bob Hurry, Tony Irvin, Chris Hayen, Jeff Glick and Jeff Cohen.

A BIG thank you goes out to Bob Cuttita for the many years of stewardship and hard work as it relates to the dam. Mariaville Lake is a wonderful community (with a beautiful lake) for lots of reasons including all of the excellent work and leadership that Bob Cuttita has done in the past. TDC looks forward to working with Bob in the near future to transition the dam operations, knowledge, files, expertise and contacts that Bob has accumulated over the years.

All new members of TDC met with the representatives of KB Engineering on Wednesday June 4th, 2025. The purpose of the meeting was for the members of the TDC to meet with the experts and review the current condition of the dam and steps to maintain and/or possible conditions to repair.

KB is under contract with MCA and will work in partnership with TDC to interface with New York State DEC on our behalf. KB informed the committee that DEC is the only governmental entity that has regulatory oversight regarding the dam.

The dam (and MCA) is current on all required reports and approvals from DEC. Certain inspections (Safety and Structural Inspection) occur yearly while a more in depth engineering assessment inspection is required every 10 years.

TDC is in the process of creating policies that are written down and maintained in a central location such that TDC and the Board has access. KB Engineering will be going through their files and getting copies of relevant information to TDC. This will allow the members to build a solid base of knowledge over and above the files and information that the TDC will obtain from Bob Cuttita.

Other items we discussed is the sink hole on Batter Street involving KB Engineering and the County. KB Engineering will do a Hydrological & Hydraulic analysis so TDC can have an analytical approach to maintaining the appropriate water level for all three sections of the lake (Mud Pond, East Basin and West Basin), maintenance of the dam and the spill way. Discussions also included field inspections by DEC, notification when opening and closing the dam and spill way (even though we don't own it) clean up obligations and various other items.

TDC plans on making a report to the MCA board at every meeting and being proactive and transparent with the "business of the dam" because TDC understands the importance of the dam to our wonderful Mariaville Lake community.

Enjoy the lake this summer!!!

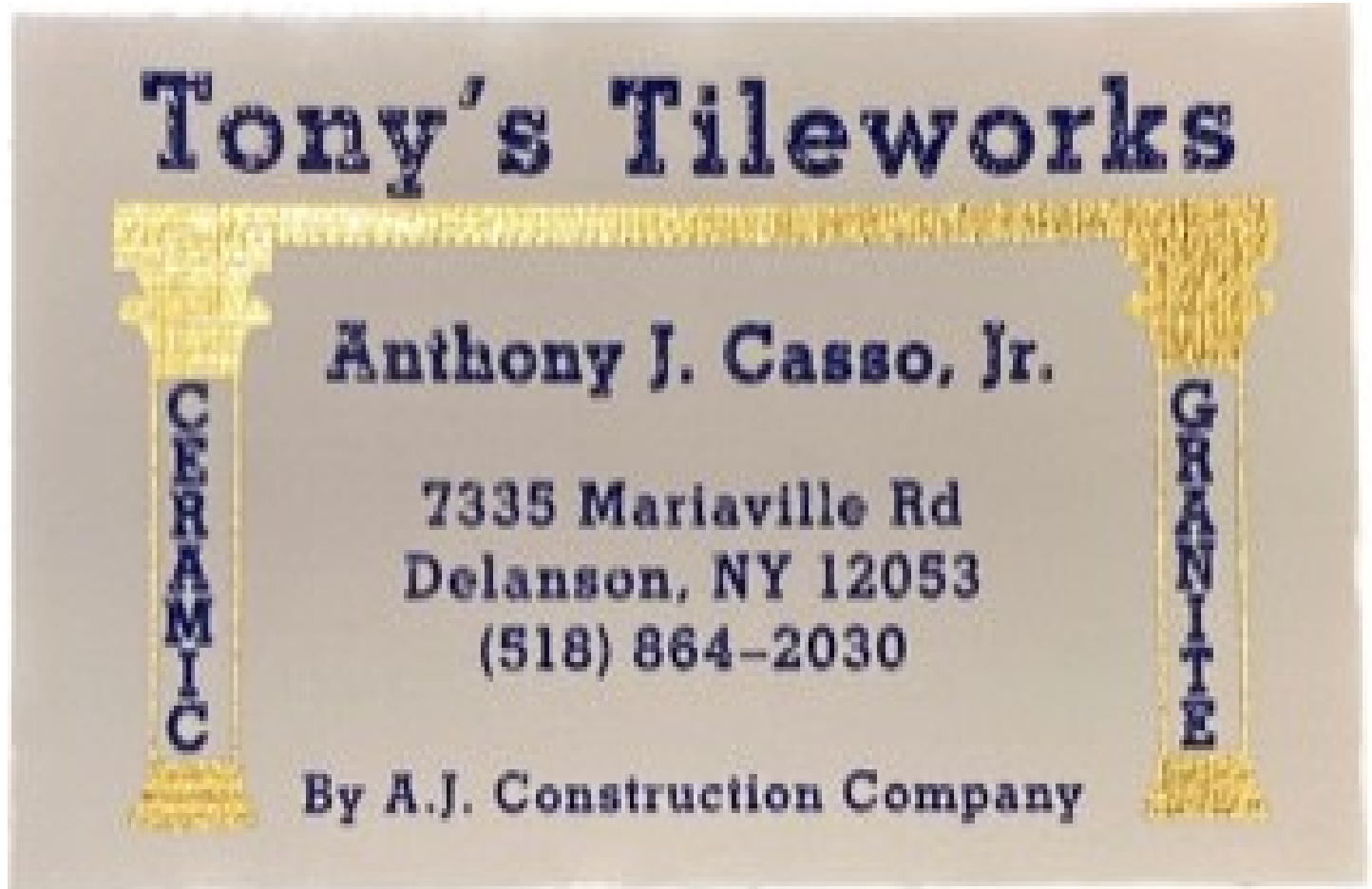
MARIAVILLE HISTORY

Did you know that Mariaville Lake once had a dance hall that drew big crowds from all over the area in the 1940's and 50's? My aunt, Shirley Bendl, used to take two buses from Gloversville with her girlfriends to make it here. One bus left the four corners in Gloversville and dropped off in Amsterdam at the top of the hill near what is now Walmart. Then, they would walk down the hill and pick-up another bus at Route 5 that brought them to Mariaville Lake. That's pretty ambitious!

For the ride home, they worked out a pretty good scheme. They would dance with the "fellas" as they used to call them and whichever one of the girls got an offer for a ride back to Gloversville, she would accept and then mention that he had to bring all the girlfriends back as well. Of course they would arrange for the girlfriend that found the poor dude to be dropped off first so there was no hanky panky.

As you may know, Mariaville Lake was a center of manufacturing in its heyday, with gristmills, sawmills and factories. I thought my aunt's story might add a little more spice to that history.

****Cooper's Award Recipient of 2025: Robert Cuttita****

The Cooper's Award, established in 1996 to honor exceptional contributions to the Mariaville community, is being awarded this year to Robert (Bob) Cuttita. This prestigious recognition is not given annually; rather, it is reserved for individuals who have demonstrated extraordinary dedication and service to the community. James Cooper, the inaugural recipient of this award, devoted countless hours to the Mariaville Civic Association (MCA) and offered free legal counsel during his tenure as he was a long-term resident of Mariaville.

Bob Cuttita has been a long-term resident of Mariaville since the early 80s with his wife, Yvette and always traveled to the lake as a child to his family camp. Bob has dedicated an impressive 38 years to the MCA, recently stepping aside for the next generation of community leaders. His tenure has been marked by significant contributions, particularly as the Dam Safety Coordinator, where his efforts have ensured the safety and integrity of the dam.



In the 1980s, Bob played a pivotal role in the dam's reconstruction, safeguarding residents from potential flooding both on the lake and downstream. Following regulatory changes in 2010, he collaborated with engineers and MCA members to develop an Emergency Action Plan, in compliance with the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) regulations. His commitment to maintaining relationships with DEC, engineers, and certified divers has been instrumental in ensuring the dam's ongoing safety through rigorous inspections over the years.

Additionally, Bob has been deeply involved in lake management over the years. Years back, he and Roger Weakley developed the weed pull bar that is still utilized today for weed removal from the lake's bottom during weed pulls. Cont. page 12

owned by Mariaville Volunteer Fire Department. The MCA was unable to sign an agreement due to insurance requirements. Larry Jasenski, a lake resident, used his company to reach a one-year agreement to manage the boat launch. It is through Larry's tireless efforts, that we have a place to launch our boats.

Weed Management Program:

My wife and I have been residents for over 30 years. For many of those years on both the east and west basin, the MCA had a weed harvesting program where residents volunteer their boats to drag a pipe that was attached to a rope to gather the weeds and bring them to the shore line, where volunteers would remove the gathered weeds and ultimately loaded onto a trailer for disposal. It has been compared to mowing your lawn.

Early in the year, the MCA board members reviewed all aspects of selecting and hiring a weed management company. The board members took into consideration how much this initiative was going to cost the MCA, which was more than \$25K to treat both sides of the lake, and the board majority voted to move forward. Upon approval, the DEC permit process began and on May 16, 2025, the necessary permits were approved. On May 19, 2025, the west basin was treated with ProcellaCOR for Milfoil. On May 19, 2025, the Nautique treatment for Curly-leaf pondweeds, nuisance invasive weeds and algae on the east basin commenced, and due to high winds and unnavigable waters, the treatment was suspended and resumed and completed on June 16, 2025. It should be noted that DEC was on site during the entire day of May 19, 2025 observing the treatment.

Upon completing treatment on June 16, 2025, Pete Pelkey took Nicole White CLM, the owner of Little Bear Environmental Consulting LLC around the west basin in his boat for a firsthand look at the effectiveness of the treatment. The treatments were successful in the west basin, but not in all areas. The end of the lake by Batter Street in the cove has weeds as does the shore line moving east. Nicole noted that these weeds were Curly- leaf pondweeds. This weed grows in the fall and winter and matures in the spring, and then dies back in the summer.

These treatments will last for 3 to 5 years. A representative from Little Bear Environmental will be back in late summer for further testing.

Chris Shaver for monthly collection of returnable bottles that net over \$2,000 yearly, which many residents did not know who was responsible.

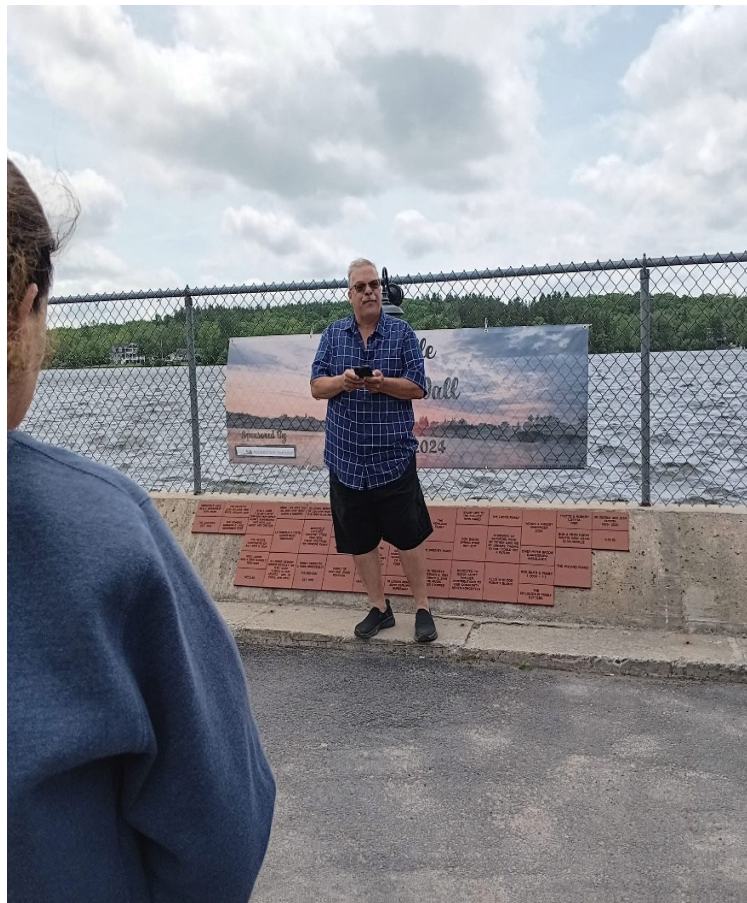
Lewis Needham for his lake management efforts over the years.

Please let me introduce myself:

I am the public relations officer of MCA. This is a brand new position created by the board of directors. It's purpose is to consolidate a closer link between the citizens of the Mariaville area and the association in order that the association may serve this community better than it has in the past. There have been some changes in the association and more will follow in the future. We have instituted some new policies such as adding board members from all areas of the community in order to represent all areas and ideas more fairly than in the past. My purpose as the public relations officer will be to address your concerns and grievances regarding the lake and the policies of the association. I will make myself as available as possible to your concerns through this news letter, mail correspondence, telephone conversations or whatever method is necessary to get to the root of those concerns and reach an understanding. I don't have any quick fixes for any problems and my only real concern is fairness and understanding and a desire to make this community a more fun and rewarding place to live for us all.

It was been brought to my attention that there are many residents of the area, permanent and seasonal, that are very dissatisfied with MCA. This for the most part seems to stem from misunderstandings from not communicating positively to the general public of the community at large. To many residents we are not their managers of the lake who are here to improve the lake and the community but rather some private organization serving its own interest. This image we must change. These people are not going to come to us. I think it is in our best interest to reach out to these residents in an effort to show them that we are here to serve their best interest, are interested in their concerns, and it's in their best interest to support us.

We, the association, need to initiate a program to change our image and communicate to the residents that this is a new era of cooperation, communication and unification of this community, and we want it to be fun working as a team, and these are our goals. We all want a lake we can be proud of and in order to achieve that goal we must first build a community we can be proud of. There are some out there with very bitter feelings towards MCA and it will not be an easy task to overcome. It will require a new and open minded effort to understand, communicate, educate and to forgive and forget. The latter being the hardest lesson for humanity to learn and is the most damaging. We must make an honest effort to consolidate our community. The challenge is ours.

In order to limit this possibility, it's almost mandatory to limit some of the outside boats. We could just charge people to launch their boats but then someone would have to be there to collect voluntarily or we would have to pay someone. The key system is an honor system based on trust, what could be fairer and provide some money to pay for a better launch and a better lake.
